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MOCK VOTE

GREENWICH

Election Day for Greenwich Elementary School was held on October 28, 2004 to coincide with the National Student / Parent Mock Election.

SCHOOL BOARD RECOGNITION

During the month of October, New York State school districts celebrate School Board Recognition Week, and we are pleased for this opportunity to honor our school board members for their dedicated leadership and their continuing efforts to provide excellent, cost-effective educational programs at GCS. Our school board members are: Albert Sykes (President), Joe O’Malley (Vice President), Judy Klingebiel, Susan Percoco, and Katherine Roome. During the past year, our Board of Education has continued to foster and support increasing levels of excellence in our academic, athletic, and extracurricular programs, setting in motion a comprehensive process of program evaluation and curriculum review, a process that has been initiated by our art and music departments in their review of “The Arts” at GCS. In future years, programs in all seven *New York State Learning Standards* areas (*The Arts; Career Development And Occupational Studies; English Language Arts; Health, Physical Education, And Home Economics; Languages Other Than English; Mathematics, Science, and Technology; Social Studies*) will be reviewed.

All school districts in New York State have faced significant financial challenges in recent years. However, our district continues to enjoy a healthy financial status. Although the New York State tax apportionment system results in variations in school tax rates among the towns within school districts, our school district’s tax rate as a whole has remained stable, with an average tax rate increase of less than 1% for the 2004-2005 school year. We are pleased to recognize the dedicated and effective leadership of our Board of Education in maintaining fiscal responsibility while at the same time fostering continuous improvement in all program areas. ■

DISTRICT HEALTH AND SAFETY COMMITTEE

At this time, I would like to describe and recognize the work of our district’s Health and Safety Committee. This committee includes over 30 representatives of our school community, including emergency services representatives and representatives of the Greenwich Volunteer Fire Company, the Village police, parents, students, faculty, staff, school supervisors, and school administrators. During the past few years, this committee has initiated the implementation of regular safety walkthroughs of each of our buildings by a building level sub-committee. Items identified as health and safety concerns, and progress in addressing these concerns, are regularly reviewed by the full committee. In addition, the Committee has created the following sub-committees:

- Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Sub-Committee
- Traffic Safety Sub-Committee
- Sub-Committee on Coordination of Responding Agencies in Emergencies
- Survey Sub-Committee

BOARD RECOGNITION & HEALTH AND SAFETY COMMITTEE

Each of these subcommittees contributes significantly toward improving the safety of our school environment on a continuing basis. The Automatic External Defibrillator (AED) Sub-Committee has helped coordinate the training of staff and the implementation of the use of AED's, or Automatic External Defibrillators, on our campus. The Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Sub-Committee reviews requirements regarding pest management and monitors their implementation. The Traffic Safety Sub-Committee has analyzed traffic flow and traffic safety concerns, recommending a number of measures such as the planned paving of parking lots and sidewalks and modifications in traffic flow, resulting in significant initiatives to improve traffic safety on our campus. The Sub-Committee on Coordination of Responding Agencies in Emergencies has planned and assisted with the implementation of detailed safety drills for our students and staff. The Survey Sub-Committee has developed and analyzed two health and safety surveys for parents and staff members to help identify health and safety concerns to be addressed by the full committee. The Sub-Committee on Environmentally Preferable Product Use has assisted our district in finding and testing the use of cleaning products that are preferable in terms of their effects on the school environment.

I would like to express my deep appreciation to the members of our Health and Safety Committee for their dedication and their many accomplishments during the past several years.

FLU AND COLD SEASON

Dear Parents/Guardians:

In consultation with our school physician, we would like to share with you the following Health Office guidelines:

1. If your child has a fever, he/she needs to stay out of school for 24 hours with their temperature below 99 degrees and they are feeling better.
2. If your child has diarrhea or is vomiting, he/she should stay home until 24 hours after the last episode occurs.
3. If your child has bacterial conjunctivitis (pink eye), he/she may return to school when the eyes are clear or 24 hours after starting an antibiotic.
4. Children should not come to school if they do not feel well before the school day starts. This helps to allow your child to return in better health and prevents the spread of illnesses.
5. As always, hand washing is the best prevention. Consider sending alcohol based hand sanitizer in to school with your child. And encourage him/her to use it frequently.
6. With flu season approaching remember flu is spread person to person in respiratory droplets of coughs and sneezes. Good prevention measures include: cough or sneeze into a tissue and then throw it away. Wash hands thoroughly with soap and warm water (or alcohol based gel/wipes). Stay home until symptoms are gone.

BUILDING ON A TRADITION

The name Paul Stillman is one that rings true to many Greenwich Elementary Alumnus, which is because Stillman has been working in residence with fourth grade classes at Greenwich for nearly two decades. Each October, Stillman brings his Native American culture and tradition into the classroom with a three day residency during which each class has the opportunity to work in a “hands on” environment with the Native Iroquois activities.

Stillman quickly restructures the student’s school life into terms of the Native American clan. Each class chooses a chief and the clan mothers and fathers are designated as the classroom teachers. The three day learning experience culminates with a traditional Pow - Wow, which includes customary activities of the Iroquois, including scraping animal skins, grinding corn, games, and dancing.

The entire experience that Stillman brings to Greenwich directly correlates with the fourth grade curriculum and the New York State Learning Standards. This opportunity is available through the continued support of Cultural Arts program at Greenwich. ■

**AG STUDENTS PLANT
TREE NURSERY**

Students in agricultural classes at Greenwich Central School have recently completed the first steps on a tree nursery program with the Village of Greenwich.

Twenty-two trees were planted by the students and about 50 total trees are planned for the Land Lab at Greenwich High School. These trees will be raised by agriculture students and replanted throughout the village in upcoming years. The new trees will be replacing trees that have become old, diseased and damaged.

Selected trees are the common Sugar Maple and Red Oak, along with compact trees such as the Japanese Tree Lilac and London Plane tree for places where space is limited. These trees were selected because of their disease and pest resistance, salt tolerance and shade-giving benefits.

Students will benefit from this experience by learning skills required to run a small-scale nursery, including planting, harvesting and pruning techniques and pest and disease management. On average it will take about six years to grow seedlings to a 3 inch trunk diameter, which is the project goal, and about 10 trees are expected to be distributed each year starting in the spring of 2006. ■

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

2005-2006 SCHOOL BUDGET

Greenwich School District residents will go to the polls on May 17, 2005, to decide on a \$16,957,803 budget for the 2005-2006 school year. This budget represents an increase of \$735,490 from the 2004-2005 school year budget, or a spending increase of 4.53%. In developing the budget, it was necessary for the Board of Education to meet the following challenges: 1) a 104.25% increase (or \$375,490) in employee retirement system costs, 2) a 6.06% increase (or \$124,193) in the cost of health insurance, and 3) increases in costs for staff and support services to cover contractual obligations.

The Board of Education, in developing the 2005-2006 budget has worked to strike a critical balance between meeting the diverse educational needs of students throughout the K-12 program and ensuring a highly accountable, cost-effective service approach on behalf of the community. The proposed budget represents continued support to improvements and initiatives which have been previously supported by the community. Included are:

1. maintenance of instructional programs and student support services;
2. maintenance of special education programs and related services;
3. maintenance of professional development programs;
4. maintenance of curriculum development and program improvement initiatives;
5. maintenance of instructional technologies;
6. maintenance of district facilities and grounds.

Continuation of the district's 5-year vehicle replacement plan will be included in a separate proposition for the purchase of four vehicles. Across all departments this budget has been developed with a "hold the line" approach. The budget includes no additional staffing for 2005-2006.

Based on current estimates of available revenues, the 2005-2006 budget will result in an estimated tax increase of 3.74% on full value, or \$.78 per \$1000 of full value. In order to provide assistance to disabled citizens and senior citizens, the Board of Education provides senior citizens tax exemptions and an exemption of up to 50% of assessed value for eligible disabled persons. Under the New York State "STAR" (School Tax Relief) Program, all primary-residence homeowners who have applied will be able to take advantage of the "basic" or "enhanced" (for senior citizens) STAR exemptions during 2005-2006. With the STAR exemption, the average homeowner with property assessed at \$100,000 will realize an estimated tax increase of \$54.61 for the 2005-2006 school year. The average senior homeowner will realize an estimated annual increase of \$39.01.

FIELD LIGHTING & HIGH SCHOOL RENOVATIONS

Last spring, the Greenwich Central School District Athletic Department and Booster Club, along with many dedicated community members, approached the Board of Education with a plan to install field lights around the football field and track to enhance our athletic program. With the Board's approval to erect the lights, the group set about raising \$200,000 to donate to the District for purchasing and installing the field lights—and, we are proud to announce, their ambitious goal has been met.

On March 22, 2005, residents of the GCS D approved a \$560,000 capital improvement project. This is a special opportunity that will provide for much needed upgrades to the District's High School instructional facilities, as well as repairs and renovations, addressing selected High School building issues at NO ADDITIONAL COST to District taxpayers.

The hard work and commitment of those students, staff and community members presents the District with a unique and pleasant opportunity.

The support of this project means the District will be able to not only install the much desired field lights that so many of our citizens worked hard to fund, but also maximize the benefit or their efforts by providing additional school improvements to benefit our students and staff. ■


